Course Description:

This course provides a fundamental introduction to Canadian Business law. Students will examine the legal issues and legal risk management related to business decision making in business context, with focus on the basic principles of contract law and tort law, which is essential to business transaction. Topics covered in this course include: tort law, contracts, property, employment, partnerships, corporations, debtor and creditor, bankruptcy and insolvency, sale of goods and consumer protection. Cases and current events will be used in the course to demonstrate legal issues and to solve business legal problems.

INDIVIDUAL COURSE PROJECT will require researching and developing a response using materials assigned by the instructor. This project will have a 2,500 word minimum, written in the



appropriate style (APA) with full citations and reference listing. Final deliverables include a final paper and a 10-15 minute Presentation.

The Exams will include discussion questions and case problems. During the exams, each student must work individually without consulting others.
